課程簡介 Course Description

This course offers an introduction to the multi-faceted world of Taiwanese religion, both locally and globally. Students will learn how religions from outside of Taiwan have taken root there, adapting and changing according to local conditions, and how new religious movements have arisen on the island. At the same time, we will see how Taiwanese religious groups have spread beyond Taiwan.

課程目標與學習成效 Goals & Learning Outcomes

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The course will introduce students to relevant theories and approaches in studying religion in Taiwan, while providing an overview of the history and beliefs that have shaped its religious world. By the time the course concludes, students will have acquired an understanding of the core history, issues and theoretical approaches in the study of this important aspect of Taiwanese society.

每週課程進度與作業要求 Course Schedule & Requirements

Sessions on the topics listed below are held on Mondays and Thursdays at 16:00-19:00 Taipei time. They will consist of a two-hour interactive lecture and a one-hour discussion-based seminar. The course handbook will indicate readings to be completed before each session.

- **1. Folk belief (July 12, Monday, 16:00-19:00)**. Besides the institutionalized religions we will cover in this module, a range of other, diffused traditions make up the world of Taiwanese folk religion. This lecture will cover these beliefs and practices, with a particular focus on the deity Mazu.
- **2.** Yiguandao (July 15, Thursday, 16:00-19:00). Taiwan is home to newer religious traditions as well as more established ones. This lecture provides an introduction to the study of new religious movements, taking Yiguandao as an example.
- 3. Catholicism (July 19, Monday, 16:00-19:00). In this lecture we consider the introduction of Catholicism to Taiwan, and its history on the island. A particular focus will be Taipei's relations with the Holy See. Our discussion will be framed in the context of theoretical work on church-state relations.
- <u>4. Protestantism (July 22, Thursday, 16:00-19:00)</u>. This lecture will cover the historical growth trajectory of Protestant Christianity in Taiwan. Our discussion will consider processes of indigenization and sinicization.
- <u>5. Foguang Shan (July 26, Monday, 16:00-19:00)</u>. Foguang Shan, or 'Buddha's Light Mountain', is a major Buddhist group in Taiwan. This lecture will consider its background and history alongside theoretical work on religion and modernization, while also considering other issues related to the group and its founder.
- <u>6. Tzu Chi (July 29, Thursday, 16:00-19:00)</u>. The final lecture in the course will provide an overview of the Buddhist group Tzu Chi, including its formation and present-day activities. Theoretical background will be provided through our discussion of 'civil society'.
